Psalm 73: The Season of Cynicgiving

1. When Life Feels Backwards (Psalm 73:1-15)

- Asaph feels the unfairness of life: the wicked prosper while he struggles.
- Cynicism grows in the gap between "what should be" and "what is."
- His envy reveals the collapse of his assumed moral reward system.
 - o "If I do good, I get good. If I do bad, I get bad."

2. When the Reward System Fails (Psalm 73:16-22)

- Asaph admits the deeper issue: his goodness had been transactional.
- Tim Keller: "His obedience was not to please God but for God to please him."
- Entering the sanctuary reorients his vision:
 - The wicked stand on "slippery places."
 - His bitterness has distorted his view of God.
 - O Worship reveals what analysis never could.

3. When God Becomes the Reward (Psalm 73:23-28)

- "Nevertheless, I am continually with You"—God held him even in bitterness.
- The rebellious have much—but not God's presence, counsel, or glory.
- Asaph's conclusion: "Whom have I in heaven but You?"
